1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree College for Boys, Karimnagar [TTWRDC (B) Karimnagar] is one of the leading residential degree colleges in the state of Telangana. It is one among the 22 residential degree colleges established in the state of Telangana under the aegis of TTWREIS (Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society) (Gurukulam), Tribal Welfare Department, Telangana Government as part of the KG to PG education policy of the then Government of Telangana. It was established on 06 July 2017. It aims to provide quality higher education to marginalized and underprivileged students from tribal communities.

Our parent society, TTWREIS provides all kinds of assistance needed for the institution. It provides all the financial support to the college. It supplies various material like amenities for the students, lab equipment, study material, furniture etc to the institution. It also extends all the support in the day to day administration of the institution. It runs various academic support initiatives for our students like conducting specialized coaching for various tests like IIT-JAM, CAT, GRE, Civil services prelims coaching, Data science camp for placements in corporate entities etc.

The college is affiliated to Satavahana University, Karimnagar. The college initially started with 04 UG Programs. At present, the college is offering 04 UG Programs, of which 03 are CBCS based programs and 01 program is Non-CBCS. The college is providing academic flexibility by offering the students CBCS Programs. The College presently comprises 12 Departments.

The college is spread over 53055.1 Sft. Carpet Area and it has 15 classrooms and 06 Laboratories. The college is well equipped with all the necessary physical facilities and amenities needed for the holistic development of our students like a fully equipped gymnasium, playground, sports equipment, NCC, NSS units etc. Faculty are recruited through a screening test and demo by TREIRB (Telangana Residential Educational Institutions Recruitment Board), which is responsible for recruiting staff for all the institutions under our parent society. This standardized recruitment process ensures that only qualified individuals are recruited as staff in the institution.

The college was recognized by the UGC under 2(f) of the UGC Act 1956 on 13th April 2023. Further, our institution has got certified with ISO 21001:2018 for Education Quality Management System, ISO 14001:2015 for Environmental Management System and ISO 50001:2018 for Energy Management System.

Vision

“To be a premier residential higher educational institution which is innovative in teaching, learning and research activities and empowers the marginalized and underprivileged students by providing holistic learning opportunities to be self reliant and responsible individuals.”

The telangana tribal welfare residential degree college for boys, karimnagar was established with an aspiration to serve and empower the students from the underserved tribal communities of the state. The institution has always sought to uplift the students by providing comprehensive learning opportunities to facilitate their

growth. The institution's vision & mission summarizes the core objectives and goals it strives to achieve in its future.

Mission

- Our mission is to empower the students to use his own academic, physical, mental, Spiritual and emotional potential and channel them for the welfare of the individual and Society as a whole.
- To strive for quality education in keeping with the motto of the college, "Educate, Enlighten, Emancipate and Empower the Students from oppressed and marginalized communities" and prepare young minds for imbibing knowledge, Skills and Sensitivity.
- To provide the students with knowledge, skills, values and Sensitivity to face the challenges in life both in academic field as well as in their personal life.
- Facilitating the students to engage with various sections of the surrounding society to cultivate sensitivity.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The Institution is located beside a main bypass road in Karimnagar city and has 53055.1 Sft. Carpet Area.
- The college was recognized by the UGC under 2 (f) of the UGC Act 1956 on 13th April 2023.
- Our institution has got certified with ISO 21001:2018 for Education Quality Management System, ISO 14001:2015 for Environmental Management System and ISO 50001:2018 for Energy Management System.
- The college has 01 NSS and 01 NCC Unit (FSFS- Fully Self Financing Scheme).
- The college has 15 classrooms, 06 Laboratories, 11 Dormitories, 01 Seminar Hall with a smart board and an overhead projector, 01 Gymnasium, 01 RO plant for potable drinking water etc.
- The College admits students through a dedicated admission test "TGRDCCET" and through "DOST" which is "Degree Online Services, Telangana", an admission portal of Telangana State.
- Our college is a Residential College, hence we offer facilities like accommodation, mess, Note Books, Text Books, Uniform Clothes, Track suits, PT dresses, Trolley Bags, Sports Shoes, Utensils etc. all free of cost to the students.
- The college library has 5214 Text Books, 2572 Reference Books, Employment news including 4 different news papers.
- The faculty are highly qualified with 03 faculty have Ph.D.s, 05 faculty have enrolled for Ph.D. degrees in various universities and 16 faculty have either NET or SET.
- Our institution has implemented E-Governance in many areas like Student Academic Monitoring Software (SAMS) for Staff and Student Attendance as well as Academics, Financial Accounting Software (FAS) for Accounting, "TSMESSGURU", a diet menu management application for the management of college mess provisions, attendance marking and leave record are done through "Telangana State Technology Services Aadhaar Based Attendance System" (TSTS-ABAS) for Staff and Students.
- Our institution has a registered alumni association. It participates in the development of the college by actively contributing through various means.
- PG and Employability Coaching: Every student in second and final year is mandated to either take pg

coaching or employability skills coaching. Students are encouraged to select a subject for pg coaching and are given coaching throughout the year until the end of the VI semester. Numerous students have achieved good ranks in various state and central pg entrance exams.

- We have a dedicated Health Centre “PANACEA” in the college where 02 Nursing Officers are available in the college 24/7.

Institutional Weakness

- The institution is presently run in a rented premise which limits the expansion of the college activities in various ways.
- Since the institution is run in rented premise temporarily, it is facing shortage of important facilities like indoor stadium, a fully equipped outdoor stadium and physical space for many other essential physical facilities.
- As our institution is aspiring to achieve good standards in all areas, there is a strong need to upgrade all the facilities like infrastructure, amenities etc.
- The college has shortage of Non-Teaching staff which is causing hindrance for the effective teaching learning process.
- The institution offers limited number of academic programs due to scarcity of physical space thereby limiting the number of academic programs available for the students.
- Only a few certificate/ value added courses have been introduced in the college for enhancing the learning opportunities of the students.
- Although many faculty have research orientation, lack of facilities like IPR cell, incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge hinders the research process.
- The institution is poorly connected with industries and other entities due to absence of industries in the surrounding areas of the college which results in the lack of funding from industries and lack of industrial exposure to students.
- The large book collection in the college library needs to be fully digitalized so as to make them accessible to students online.
- Most of the students are first generation learners from poor financial as well as academic background. This hinders the teaching learning process of the student community of the college.

Institutional Opportunity

As a residential college, students stay in the institution 24/7. So, they are encouraged to partake in various curricular and co-curricular activities like various clubs as well as PG/Employability skills coaching thereby providing them a platform to transform themselves into multi skilled students.

Apart from the regular PG/Employability coaching for all the second and final year students, special intensive coaching for IIT JAM, CAT, GRE-TOEFL, “Civil Services” Prelims coaching, Film making, data science, Matlab etc is given to interested students free of cost so that the students need not worry about any financial difficulties and focus on their academics.

Efforts are under way to start more certificate courses and value added courses to impart additional skills and knowledge in the days to come.

Various MOUs and collaborations our institution has with varied entities like “Heartfulness Yoga” (Shri Ram

Chandra Mission), Mission Bhageeratha (Drinking Water grid project of Telangana) and many higher educational institutions can improve the skills, abilities and exposure to industries and wider society thereby enhancing the job opportunities of the students.

Our institution is aiming to get a good grade in NAAC assessment and accreditation process. So, that our institution gets recognition as well as support through various means.

Many students discontinue higher education due to financial or other difficulties. Being a residential educational institution, our college provides free accommodation, free academics as well as nutritious food to all the students irrespective of their social or financial background. This has encouraged poor students to pursue higher education without worrying about financial difficulties. This has reduced the dropout rate of the students.

Institutional Challenge

Predominant numbers of students of our college are from regional language backgrounds as well as are first generation learners in their families which make teaching and learning process a challenging task for both teachers and learners.

Constant repair and maintenance of the infrastructural facilities and the building as a whole is one of the greatest challenges since the college is run in a rented premise.

The limited number of industries limits the students' opportunities to get internships and other kinds of practical trainings which are essential for students' all round growth.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

· The Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree College for Boys, karimnagar is affiliated to Satavahana University. Our institution does not participate in the design of curriculum and syllabus. The syllabus prescribed by the university is followed in the college. The syllabus not only focuses on acquiring knowledge but also on the skill enhancement and higher order thinking skills.

· The academic Calendar is designed based on the almanacs provided by the university and monthly academic calendars provided by our head office of Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society (Our parent organization). 90 days of class work is allotted for syllabus coverage, conducting internal examinations, assignments, seminars, slip tests, group discussions and other co-curricular activities in every semester.

· Academic flexibility is offered to students in the selection of courses. Choice Based Credit System has been implemented from 2022-23. To increase academic flexibility and encourage students to diversify their learning experience, TTWREI society (Our parent organization) has decided to encourage the students by reimburse the fee of one certificate course upon successful completion in a year. Many departments in our

institution offer certificate courses in every academic year to encourage the students broaden their learning experience.

· Curriculum enrichment is ensured by offering Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC), Skill Enhancement Course (SEC) and Generic Elective (GE) courses. This enables the students to learn career oriented, skill oriented and entrepreneurship oriented education. the college aspires to integrate cross-cutting topics into the curriculum by implementing numerous academic activities on gender sensitization, environmental studies, human values and professional ethics through general electives and skill enhancement courses. Students also partake various curricular and co-curricular activities like project work/field work/internships to enhance their learning experience.

· Feedback from Stakeholders including students, teachers, alumni, and parents is collected, analyzed, and appropriate follow-up action is taken. All the inputs are analyzed and suitable measures are recommended to maintain the quality of the institution. The feedback is submitted to the appropriate bodies to get their response on various issues

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

· The Student admission process in the college in various Undergraduate programs is conducted through Degree Online Services, Telangana (DOST), Telangana Residential Degree College Common Entrance Test (TGRDCCET), and through spot admissions according to the TTWREI Society (our parent institution) policy admissions.

· The admission policy is strictly adhered to while taking admissions into various programs offered by the college. Being a tribal welfare educational institute, a substantial number of seats are allotted to students from tribal communities and the remaining seats are allotted to students from other reserved categories following the admission policy of the college.

· Currently, there are 343 students on roll for the academic year 2023-2024 in 04 undergraduate programmes. The present Student –teacher ratio is 1:17.

· For Effective teaching-learning process, Faculty adopts an interactive teaching style that encourages practical experience of students and usage of ICT tools along with various methodologies that make instruction more experiential as well as interactive. In order to gain hands on experience, practical sessions are conducted where students' participation is utmost important. Well equipped computer lab, LCD projectors enhance the ability of the students to utilize the resources as a substitute to virtual learning. Seminars, poster presentations, projects are given to foster the creativity and innovation. Field visits, industrial tours are also encouraged to enrich students' knowledge.

· The faculty are well qualified with 03 faculty have Ph.D.s, 05 faculty have enrolled for Ph.D. degrees in various universities and 16 faculty have either NET or SET. 25 full time faculty are rendering their services for this academic year 2023-2024.

· Continuous internal evaluation is adopted for the whole academic year. Internal assessment is carried to assess the students. The college assesses the student's performance via assignments, objective type test, quiz, student seminars, debates etc. During evaluation process, the learning abilities of the students are identified and suitable corrective measures are taken like conducting remedial classes for the future learners. Course

Outcomes (COs) and Program Outcomes (POs) are part of the Outcome Based Education (OBE) these POs and COs are outlined by the affiliating university. The students are acquainted about POs and COs at the beginning of the program. These are assessed at the end of the respective courses and programmes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college's faculty members are actively engaged in research and participated in national and international seminars and workshops. A few of the faculty have enrolled for Ph.D. degree at various universities and the 'research coordination committee' of the college is encouraging the remaining faculty to enroll for Ph.D. programme.

"The research coordination committee" is actively working on exploring the possibilities of receiving grants from different funding agencies like DST, DBT, CSIR, ICMR, UGC etc. Guidance on writing the proposals for funding is given by the Ph.D. holders who already have experience in working under DST and UGC (MRP) research projects. Interdepartmental activities are encouraged and research proposals having multidisciplinary approach are also being planned to organize seminars.

In the past five years, Faculty have organized 14 online seminars and national level quiz competitions. 05 research articles were published in different UGC care journals.

To enhance students' knowledge about the trees on campus, QR codes have been assigned to each tree, enabling students to scan them and access additional information. The college's students delivered live lectures on the TSAT Nipuna Channel.

Extension activities:

Various college committees are actively involved in a wide range of extension activities.

Our college NSS Unit has initiated various programs like NSS Special Camps, Swatch Bharath, Haritha Haram, AIDS awareness programme, programs on awareness about election like 'sweep', election rallies in co ordination with district administration.

The college has an NCC unit. Our NCC Cadets actively participate in various national integrity activities, community services, and initiatives centered around environmental cleaning like 'puneet Sagar Abhiyan' to clean the surroundings of a nearby water reservoir Lower Manair Dam' (LMD) etc.

MOUs: The institution has established MOUs with many public sector entities like Mission Bhagiradha and higher education institutions for faculty exchange, industrial tours, soft skills training etc for providing additional learning opportunities to the students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The college is located in a premise with a built up area of 53055.1 Sq.Ft including the Academic block and administration cum Hostel block.
- The institution has a total of 15 classrooms, 11 dormitories. Apart from these, there is 1 seminar hall with 1 smart board and projector and 1 computer lab with 1 LED TV. There are a total of 6 laboratories

available for botany, zoology, physics, chemistry, micro-biology and computer lab.

- The institution has adequate infrastructure for games, sports, and cultural events like a fully equipped gymnasium, sports equipment, a playground etc.
- The college has a panacea room where 02 nursing officers monitor student's health problems 24/7.
- Every year funds are allocated by our parent society (TTWREIS) for improving the infrastructure of the college like furniture, computers, lab equipment, electric and electronic goods, plumbing etc.
- The college premises are under CCTV surveillance, with cameras strategically placed in the building first floor, at building entrance and in the Mess room.
- The college library has sufficient resources to support the teaching learning process of the college. The library is automated with a library management software 'NewGenLib'.
- As many students appear for various competitive exams, the library is equipped with sufficient reference material for the benefit of the students. Faculty also visits library to refer to advanced study material in their respective subjects.
- Our institution currently has 30 computers for students' use.
- BSNL High speed Internet Wired with 100 Mbps is provided in the college.
- The current student computer ratio stands at 12.97.

The institution allots sufficient funds to maintain physical facilities of the college. Facilities are updated regularly.

Student Support and Progression

- The Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Educational Institutions Society (our parent society) provides amenities such as uniforms, carpets, bed-sheets, blankets, towels, trolley bag, utensils, notebooks, practical record books, track suits, sports dresses, PT dresses, sport shoes, cosmetic and barber charges, free accommodation and mess facility to support individuals from disadvantaged backgrounds to help them pursue higher education without worrying about any financial constraints.
- The college has initiated capacity-building and skill enhancement programs, including training in ICT/Computing Skills, Yoga, Language and Communication Skills, and Life Skills (physical fitness, health, and hygiene). Our institution has entered into an MoU with Ramachandra Mission to impart and train faculty and students about yoga & meditation.
- Collaborative efforts by TASK/Career Guidance/Placement cell, and others have significantly contributed to student placements and progression.
- PG/Employability coaching efforts have enabled numerous students to secure admissions in various postgraduate programs (M.A./M.Sc./M.Com/MBA/MCA) in renowned universities such as IITs, HCU, Pondicherry University, and various state universities like Osmania, Kakatiya, and Satavahana etc.
- Apart from the regular PG/Employability coaching for all the second and final year students, special intensive coaching for IIT JAM, CAT, GRE-TOEFL, "Civil Services" Prelims coaching, Film making, data science, MatLab etc is given to interested students free of cost. As result, many students have secured admissions in renowned universities.
- The Career guidance cell (CGC)'s dedicated efforts resulted in 10 students securing placements in esteemed organizations like IFHL.
- To foster interest in sports and cultural activities, the college organizes annual cultural events under the "Dance and Music Club." Additionally, various sports events are held on prominent days.
- The college has a registered Alumni Association, allowing alumni members to share their insights on academic and administrative matters during meetings. Feedback is actively sought from the alumni to improve the functioning of the college. Many current faculty members and alumni association members

participate actively in college activities.

- The Alumni Association has convened several in-person meetings over the last two years, with one virtual meeting during the Covid pandemic. Notably, the association generously donated a brass metal deepam stand.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college's vision and mission are reflected in the college's strong leadership and collective decision-making. The college established a democratic, decentralized and participatory management culture to help all stakeholders develop their potential to lead the institution.

The decentralization process is implemented by delegating specific responsibilities to staff members as coordinators and in-charges of various academic and administrative committees. The implementation of the college's vision and mission is supported by a number of committees including the Student Council, the Examination Committee, the IQAC, the Women Empowerment Cell, the TASK/Career Guidance and Placements Committee and many others. In the design and development of the institution, feedback from stakeholders including students, faculty parents and alumni is included.

Participation of all the stakeholders is ensured through a perspective plan. To maintain transparency and convenience the college adopted e-governance in many areas. The Empowerment and welfare of the both teaching and non-teaching staff are priorities for the college administration. In order to expand knowledge, teachers are motivated to take part in various faculty development programmes. To encourage the faculty to pursue further education, our institution refunds the fee of the certificate course upon the successful completion of the course.

Our parent organization (TTWREI Society) regularly conducts FDPs/administrative trainings/orientation programmes for making the faculty to keep updated with the current trends in their respective areas of specialization. Our parent society (TTWREIS) provides all the financial assistance to the institution. Our institution is exploring various avenues like securing a good grade in NAAC accreditation process to get financial support from various government/ non government bodies. An external Chartered accountant (CA) audits all the financial bills on regular basis.

The IQAC has made a substantial contribution to the institutionalization of quality assurance through several initiatives in the previous 03 years. Teaching and learning process is reviewed by IQAC and it has encouraged institutional participation in social responsibility programmes such as observing NCC rallies, NSS rallies, Swaccha bharaat and plantation in Haritha haram programme. The college maintains good standards in all areas for which it has received various ISO certifications.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college has taken initiatives for the promotion of gender equity. Our institution has a women empowerment cell which co-ordinates many issues related to women staff of the college. Being a men's college, the students are sensitized towards the issues of the women by organizing various programs. Women employees of the institution are provided all kinds of amenities needed to work in a safe environment. Our institution has taken many measures to enhance the sustainability in the college campus. Various measures to conserve energy like installing solar panels, installing LED lamps etc have been started. Pits have been made to segregate degradable

and non degradable waste. Water harvesting pits have been constructed to conserve water in the premises of the college. College regularly organizes plantation drives (haritha haram) to increase the green cover in the college. A few measures have been taken by the administration to create barrier free environment and disabled friendly.

Our institution organizes 'Healthy Thursday' every week in which students of the college participates and cleans the classrooms, dormitories and college surroundings. Students of the college through NCC and NSS units participate in various programs that aim to do environmental promotion activities like 'puneet sagar abhiyan' etc.

Students from various social, cultural, linguistic, religious, regional backgrounds pursue education in our college. To promote inclusiveness, harmony and tolerance among the students, many programs and initiatives are taken like organizing national festivals, religious events, awareness programs etc.

Apart from the regular academic activities the college undertakes as part of the teaching learning process, the college has initiated some programs which have brought remarkable change in the way the college functions. These practices have brought success to our institution. Our institution has introduced PG & Employability skills coaching initiative to provide advanced academic support to students to excel in higher education and placements. Based on the success of this initiative, our institution has introduced IIT-JAM coaching for students who aspire to join the prestigious science institutions for their higher education.

In order to provide holistic learning environment to students, college has initiated outreach programs to sensitize the students about the problems faced by various sections of the population surrounding the college. This program is providing opportunities to students to empathize and establish a strong bond with different communities of people.

Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree (Boys) College, Karimnagar is affiliated to Satavahana University and adheres to the curriculum prescribed by the university. As an affiliated college, the college's freedom in terms of curriculum and evaluation is limited. This college uses the well-planned and documented process listed below to ensure the proper delivery of the curriculum.

- Academic Calendar is designed based on the calendars issued by the TTWREIS (our parent society) and Satavahana University, Telangana. 90 days of class work is conducted for syllabus coverage, conducting internal examinations, assignments, seminars, and other co-curricular activities in every semester.
- The time table for each department is made well in advance of the start of classes.
- Students' learning outcomes are measured through tests, assignments, student seminars, and academic competitions.
- This college encourages students to take part in student seminars and study projects in order to cultivate a research interest in them.
- The principal holds regular meetings with vice principal, IQAC and Academic coordinator to discuss the institution's quality and makes preparations for the upcoming year's activities.
- Soft skills and life skills are included in the curriculum of the college supervised by career guidance cell (CGC) and TASK of the college.
- This college offers free coaching for the P.G. entrance exam for the benefit of the students every year.
- Students are encouraged to enhance their academic and personal lives through the mentor-mentee system.
- A variety of innovative and ICT-based teaching methods are used to deliver the curriculum, including videos, PowerPoint presentations, extension lectures, , quizzes and field trips.
- The annual lesson plans, teaching diaries, and attendance registers are updated frequently.
- Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners to meet the basic needs of them. These classes are held at the teacher's and students' convenience.
- Certificate programs and other skill-based employability trainings are excellent complements to the existing traditional courses.
- Bridge Courses are conducted for new students.
- The college is affiliated to Satavahana University, Karimnagar. The curriculum for all the courses is designed by the board of studies of the university and same is followed by the college. The syllabus prescribed by the university is strictly followed as the examinations are conducted according to the guidelines of the university. Other co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are planned in accordance with the calendar released by TTWREIS (our parent society) head office,

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1

Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences and teachers use ICT- enabled tools including online resources for effective teaching and learning process

Response:

In recent years, there has been a shift from teacher-centered method of teaching to student-centric approach. The following Student centric methods are used for enhancing students' learning experiences.

1. Experiential Learning: The students are allowed to use laboratories of concerned departments to have hands-on experience. Laboratory is a platform for science students to learn by experimenting. All departments take the initiative to arrange the field trips and industrial tours as part of their academic activities.

2. Participative learning: Students participate in research projects to fill the gap between the industry and academia. Students by involving in projects have much better opportunity to learn, perform and experience themselves by applying basic conceptual knowledge in real life. Students are allowed to participate in Curricular activities and Non-Curricular activities. In curricular activities, students are given opportunity to join clubs such as the E+ club, Literary Club, STEM Club & Entrepreneurship Club to exhibit their hidden talents and interests. Telangana Academy for Skills and Knowledge (TASK), an initiative of the Telangana government, is providing various opportunities for student community to enhance their skills. Non-Curricular activities and Extra Curricular activities are opportunities available for students to participate in NSS, NCC and Sports & Games.

3. Problem Solving Methodologies: The primary goal of education is to help students to see existing problems and propose viable solutions. The institution makes every effort to provide its students with environments conducive for the development of their critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Project based learning is used to examine current problems and to collaboratively evaluate solutions for current problems. It provides experience for students to solve problems and enhances critical thinking that is required for them after graduation.

4. ICT Teaching and Learning: The teaching staff has been using ICT in teaching, learning and assessment & evaluation. There is one computer lab in campus equipped with ICT enabled facilities for teaching and learning. Digital Classrooms have been successfully used during the COVID period utilizing multi-media in teaching with the help of the audio, visuals and video sources for learning. Audio-visual platforms are used to facilitate the teaching and learning processes like using "Google Class Room", "Microsoft Teams", "Google Meet", "Zoom sessions," and making YouTube videos. Each faculty member shares recorded classes, digital videos, digital material, reference text books & notes (digital library links) and Power Point presentations (Material) which are posted in the college website and concerned whatsapp groups. They are encouraged to participate in certificate courses through MOOCS by providing fee for a certificate course in a year. Multimodal learning methods make students to grasp concepts and enable students to perform better in academics.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

Response:

Mechanism of Internal assessment

Internal assessment of the college is carried out in accordance with the university rules in a prescribed pattern and as per the schedule provided by the university. The university recommended conducting two internal assessment exams in each semester. Internal assessment aids the teacher in evaluating the students on a regular basis. There is a well-organized, dynamic system in place to ensure the smooth running of internal examinations. The entire procedure is transparent and robust. Internal examinations are overseen by academic coordinator and examination branch. Following the completion of internal assessment tests, lecturers conduct the evaluation process. Internal assessment is graded on a variety of factors, including the viva, assignments and objective test. Internal examination accounts for 20% of total marks, while external examination accounts for remaining 80%. The concerned faculty members prepare the question papers and the required photocopies are distributed to the exam halls. Faculty members evaluate the answer papers and the results are recorded in the students' marks register and uploaded to the university website. The students are provided the valued answer scripts to ensure that they have been fairly valued, and they are informed of their final marks.

Mechanism of External assessment

The affiliating university is responsible for the external assessment of the academic process through semester end examinations. A practical examination is held at the end of the course to evaluate the laboratory course. The external exam question paper is set in a highly confidential manner by university through a subject expert. The university sends the semester's question papers online, and they are printed at the test centre 30 minutes before the commencement of the exam. Invigilators, chief superintendent, examination coordinator, external observers, and flying squads supervise the administration of end-of-semester exams. The Satavahana University evaluates the answer scripts involving evaluators who are subject lecturers under the university and the university started using online evaluation method for answer scripts.

Mechanism for Exam related grievances: The Institution provides a healthy mechanism to ensure transparency in the examination related grievances. The timetables of all examinations are displayed on college notice boards and on various E platforms well in advance to give adequate preparation time for the students.

During Covid19 pandemic, all this information is communicated by group in charges through WhatsApp and phone calls.

Grievance Redressal system. The grievances of students regarding internal assessment, such as errors in counting or evaluation are resolved by the respective subject teachers in a timely manner. If a grievance is not addressed at the teacher level, it may be brought to the attention of the respective department in-charges who will then bring it to the attention of the institution's Head for further redress. The faculty members also consider students who fail to appear in the internal assessment test and apply for a re-test with valid reasons. The well experienced convener and members of the examination branch explain the students about the internal exam's procedure with the help of guidelines issued by the affiliating University. The affiliating university handles complaints related to external examinations by correcting

errors through revaluation.

Course Outcomes (COs) are evaluated at the end of each course, whereas Program Outcomes (POs) are assessed at the end of the programme.

Based on the learners' needs, recent job market trends, and feedback from stakeholders, the university designs the curriculum. As the institution is affiliated to Satavahana University, the curriculum is provided by the university. The framing of outcomes is discussed in Board of Studies meetings.

At institution level, COs and POs are discussed in the departments, during the annual plan preparation and workload sharing discussions at the beginning of academic year. P.O.s are prepared by Heads of the departments and approved by the principal and the Course Outcomes (C.O.s) are framed by the respective course teachers and monitored by the Head of the department concerned. The department designs the Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) keeping in view of the scope of the program.

Beginning of the course all the departments frame necessary material and under take responsibility of bridge course and student outcome is recorded through objective tests. Super student competitions are conducted to reveal the talents hidden that contribute to their subject or course enrichment.

Industrial tours by various departments contribute in achieving the desired programme and course outcomes. University academic competitions are participated by students from various departments. All academic activities, such as class work, Practical classes, lab work, field work, student project works, student seminars and co-curricular activities are carried out in accordance with the C.O.s, and P.O.s. experimental learning adopted in teaching-learning process is contributing in achieving programme and course outcomes. Various sources like reference books and other types of reference material are made available to students in departments as well as in the college library to facilitate uninterrupted learning. Pg. coaching by all departments of institution is becoming fruitful in achieving objectives which are

meant to achieve.

TASK Programme helps in revealing various skills that are already hidden in the student and encourages them to develop skills too. Career guidance cell in this institution provides an opportunity to all the students in earning best livelihood as he excels in his academics. Communication of PO's, and CO's: C.O.s and P.O.s are communicated to students through college website and notice boards of the college. P.O.s is explained in the orientation program for newly admitted students every year. C.O.s are explained to students at the start of the semester, along with the syllabus

Every year the college evaluates the attainment of Program Outcomes and Course Outcomes by adopting suitable methods. The process of measuring the attainment of the POs and COs is different from each other. The assessment methods that are generally used to measure the attainment of POs and Cos are of two types. They are direct method and indirect method.

Various methods are adopted for assessing the attainment of programme and course outcomes. These include slip tests, assignments, internal examinations, practical exam sessions, pre-final and final examinations are the methods through which programme and course outcomes are evaluated.

As per the university prescribed pattern, external examinations are conducted for 80 marks. Pre-finals are also conducted for 80 marks at institutional level.

External examiners are allotted by, Satavahana University for maintaining the transparency in conducting practical exams .external examinations are attempted outside the institution in various examination centers.

1. Direct Method: Under this method, the attainment of COs is measured by observing the performance of the students in Continuous Internal Evaluations and semester end examinations. Continuous assessment provides feedback on the efficacy of the teaching-learning process and learning outcomes of each course. This is in the form of assignments as well as additional quizzes, tests and assignments, pre-finals which are periodically given to students.

In this method, the performance is shown as a grade based on the total marks obtained by the student both in Internal Examination (20 Marks) and Semester exams (80 Marks). A good number of students achieved outstanding grades in the individual subjects during the last five years. Under this method,

Program Outcomes can be measured by examining the results achieved by the students across the programs in semester examinations.

2. Indirect Method: Under this method the attainment is measured by collecting the data from the students by conducting student survey and alumni survey etc. The attainment of POs and PSOs can be measured by observing the performance of the students in various competitive exams attended and co-curricular activities such as elocution, debate, seminars and preparation of assignments, student study projects and performance in the programs organized by TASK (Telangana Academy Skill And Knowledge) and Career Guidance Cell. A good number of students have achieved meritorious ranks in PG Entrance Exams and got seats in reputed universities. The college has trajectory of achieving good number of PG seats in reputed Universities. To track program outcomes, the departments maintain an alumni data-base, regularly updating information on their current employment and other endeavors.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Response:

Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree College for Boys, Karimnagar is located at Karimnagar with a built up area of 53,056.21 sq.mts with an easy access to bus and other transport modes making it one of the most sought after colleges in and around Karimnagar town.

Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree College for boys, Karimnagar has constantly endeavored to provide quality education and all round development to the students in order to create awareness, responsibility and empowerment. The institution has well maintained, user friendly and resilient infrastructure conducive to teaching, learning and comprehensive development of students.

Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential degree College for Boys, Karimnagar is providing adequate infrastructure that facilitates teaching and learning. Therefore, the institution strives to provide the necessary infrastructure for smooth academic operations. For this, the institution's administration meets to review the physical infrastructure from time to time. The administration decides the policies and initiatives to be taken up for the improvement of infrastructure. The institution also gives priority for the creation and enhancement of infrastructure in annual budget allocation.

At present, The college comprises 15-spacious, well-ventilated classrooms, 6-science laboratories (Botany, Zoology, Microbiology, Chemistry, physics and computer science), 1-Chemistry Storeroom, 3 Departmental rooms, 1-library, 1-Seminar Hall equipped with LCD projector and Smart Board for digital classes, 4 ICT Enabled Class rooms, 1-Panacea room for Health facilities, 1-Sports room, 1-NCC office, 1-CGC room, 1-Gymnasium, 1-Administrative Office, 1-Principal's Chamber and 4-Restrooms.

In our college, Healthcare facilities are available to the students. The Institution has 2 Nursing officers who are available 24/7 in the college. The services of the doctors available locally are also utilized to create health awareness among students. The in-charge of each facility (In-charges of the Departments, Librarian, Physical Director, etc.) maintains stock and accession registers. These registers are verified annually by the Annual Departmental Verification Committees. These Committees are constituted from the members of faculty related to other departments.

The institution strongly believes that education is all round development of the student. Therefore, sports and games are given utmost importance on par with academics. For this, the institution has an exclusive physical Director for sports and games. To ensure the mental as well as physical health

of the students, training in various games and sports is imparted. In order to achieve this, outdoor games such as Volleyball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Shuttle Badminton, Ball Badminton, Tennikoit, Caroms, Chess etc. are included in daily activities. In addition to these sports and games, training in Yoga and Meditation also is given to develop a sound mind, body and soul. The institution has a well equipped gymnasium with Square weight plates, Gym balls, Hex Dumbbells, Weighing Machine, Incline and Decline bench. Yoga and meditation are carried out in the open place within the building under the guidance of the Yoga Trainers available in the town. To encourage students to participate in meditation, the institution has entered into an MoU with Sri Ram Chandra Mission which organises meditation sessions regularly for staff as well as students. To encourage the students to participate actively in sports and games, competitions are held in various events. The college has a Seminar Hall which is generally used for the practice and conduct of various cultural activities such as Singing, Dancing, Elocution, Essay Writing, Skit Play, Mono action and other cultural activities.

Description:

Our Library is the heart and treasure of our institution. It consists of one hall of dimensions of 133.155 square meters and it is situated on the left side at the entrance of the first floor.

It contains 8,103 documents which include text books for different streams. Our institution offers B.Sc. (M.P.C., M.St.Ds., B.Z.C., Mb.Z.C.), B.Com(CA) & BA(CA). We also have subject wise reference books as patrons can utilize the textbooks and also refer to other popular authors' books for better understanding. Apart from this, we also have books for Post-Graduation coaching, practice books, Telugu novels, English novels, and NCERT books for the access of students. We also have books related to aptitude, Reasoning, Banking exams to encourage our students to get a job in government sectors to serve the society. The arrangement of shelving of documents is "subject arrangement" by the instruction.

We preserve documents with closed shelving (Glass Almiras).The room is having good ventilation and aeration. we maintain transparency among Textbooks and Reference books. We provide Educational and Entertainment based resources from library like SHINE INDIA, YOJANA and KURUKSHETRA monthly magazines and some free subscription and free access portals those are "e-resources for self learning. We provide 'THE HINDU' weekly magazine. Our library organizes Orientation Programs to Fresh patrons, Book Exhibitions to attract patrons' attention towards Library Services and National library week [Nov-14 to 20] celebrations to tell the importance of the library. We also have Internet to facilitate and give more flexible, accurate and transparent information to the users without delay.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

The institution makes sure that students and teachers have good computer facilities. They have sufficient computer systems that help them use technology for teaching, office work, and the library. This means everyone can easily access digital tools and services they need for institutions and work.

- As technology plays an important role in education, it is well-equipped with IT facilities.
- The college is equipped with 33 computers for students and faculty to use. Additionally, there is a digital TV available for multimedia purposes. The seminar hall is equipped with one projector and one digital smart board, which allows for interactive presentations and discussions. These technological amenities enhance the learning experience and facilitate effective communication and collaboration within the college community.
- Our institution is currently using B.S.N.L. High-Speed Internet Wired with 100Mbps Speed. A LAN service which provides internet access to the students and staff is established.
- The college has its own official YouTube channel, where any number of lectures, NSS activities, college programs like freshers party, farewell party can be uploaded and students can access what is relevant to them.
- The computers are used by students for practical sessions and for online exams also.
- Training programmes on the usage of new technology that is essential for teaching and other processes such as Basic computer skills and Smart Board usage are conducted for faculty members. By participating in these programs, faculty members enhance their proficiency in integrating technology into their teaching methods and administrative tasks, ultimately enriching the educational experience for students and improving overall efficiency within the institution.

- The college contains Copier machines, Computers, Wi-Fi router, Printers, CC cameras and Biometric device for administration purpose.
- The college has 1 UPS & 20 Batteries (computer Lab) and 1 inverter.
- For continuous monitoring of all activities 06 CCTV cameras are installed.
- Staff members have access to 1 Biometric Device and can also mark their attendance through “Telangana State Technology Services Aadhaar Biometric Attendance System application” (TSTS ABAS) in mobiles that are linked to the Our Head Office (TTWREIS) for the purpose of recording attendance and monitoring.
- The college has registered on the TASK website and conducts online and offline training sessions to the students through TASK to up skill the student’s knowledge.
- The college has its own official website where we can upload college information and activities conducted in college on a daily basis.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

Internal and external financial audits are conducted regularly in the institution to promote accountability and transparency of financial transactions of the institution. At the beginning of the academic year, all the departments prepare budget requirements that are consolidated and the institution's budget prepared accordingly. The college receives grants from Our parent society (TTWREIS) of Telangana state Government. This is done through meetings by the principal with teaching and non-teaching staff as well as representatives of the students. The major purchases of furniture, lab equipment, amenities, diet charges, cosmetic charges and all other major expenditures are borne by parent society. Miscellaneous expenses are borne by the college. The office of the college maintains cash books, collects vouchers and once the money has been spent, utilization certificate is obtained. In order to maintain transparency, the records are maintained under supervision of the Administrative officer.

Audit process: Major aspects covered in the audit process are verification of invoices/ bills according to budget, financial statements, subsidiary books etc. The process includes financial planning, verifications and suggestions for further improvements.

Internal Audit: Internal audit is conducted within the college. Intra departmental audit is conducted in the college every year which audits the accounts periodically in a financial year. Upon the receipt of the audited utilization certificates, income and expenditure statements and bills, the same shall be submitted to the respective sources / bodies and they in turn perform the audit for the funds utilized. The Principal constitutes committees for conducting annual stock verification where the members physically verify the equipment, systems and other resources available in the departments and inspects the records maintained by them. Our parent society (TTWREIS) has dedicated vigilance wing which oversees the financial transactions in all the institutions under the society. Vigilance Team visits the college and conducts the audit once in a year.

External Audit: External audit is conducted periodically and issues the audit report to the institution. A team of four to five members visits the institution for a period of five to six days and scrutinizes the various aspects of functioning. The team finally gives suggestions for any modifications for effective functioning of the institution.

Response:

The college has a strong and proactive IQAC. Since 2022, it has undertaken many initiatives in the college. The primary objective of IQAC committee is to improve standards in both academic and administrative areas. In order to achieve the institution's vision and mission, the IQAC committee works to foster a sense of unity among the teaching faculty.

The IQAC takes the following steps to formalize quality assurance strategies and processes:

- By conducting meetings on a regular basis, the IQAC assures over all internal quality in the delivery of education through curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities.
- The IQAC encourages all departments to schedule the preparation and implementation of their departmental action plan, annual curricular plan and departmental timetable in accordance with the academic calendar and almanac of the affiliating University.
- Certificate courses: IQAC provides a comprehensive list of certificate courses to faculty members and encouraged them to offer these courses to students.
- The IQAC encourages faculty to participate in RCs (Refresher Courses), OCs (Online Courses) and FDPs (Faculty Development Programmes). In addition, it encourages students to take part in student seminars.
- Through WEC (Women Empowerment Cell), NCC (National Cadet Crops) and NSS (National Service Scheme), the IQAC encourages its staff and students to take part in community outreach initiatives.

The IQAC continuously reviews and takes steps to improve the quality of teaching-learning process. The academic calendar is prepared in advance, displayed and circulated in college and strictly followed. All the newly admitted students will be acquainted with the various resources available in college with the orientation program. Important announcements are made available to the students in the form of circulars, notices, notice board, etc.

The institution carefully examines its teaching-learning process, operational structures and procedures, and learning outcomes on a regular basis. The IQAC actively participates in assuring high-quality education and adopts methods to raise the standard of the teaching and learning process.

The following methods are used by the institution to assess its teaching-learning process:

1. **Collecting feedback from stakeholders:** Feedback is collected from students, faculty members and alumni every year. It is analysed, actions to be taken are identified and implemented. The analysis and Action Taken Report (ATR) are uploaded on institution's website.
2. **Internal Academic Audit:** Internal academic audits are conducted every year by the principal and IQAC.
3. **Review on Teaching Methodologies:** In view of contemporary teaching trends, new methodologies are adopted for the academic learning process. During the COVID pandemic, conventional offline teaching has been replaced with online teaching. Faculty members were given necessary training to enable them to use online teaching technologies like Zoom and YouTube.
4. **Attainment of Program Outcomes:** Necessary priority is given to attain Program Outcomes (P.O.s), Course Outcomes (C.O.s) and Program Specific Outcomes P.S.O.s. These are measured through assignments, Internal, end semester tests, progression to higher education and placements.
5. **Review of Examination Results:** Examination result analysis is done at departments. This makes it possible to see if the course goals are being met or not, and if not, steps can be taken to help slow learners catch up through remedial teaching.

- In 2021, our college established a Women's Empowerment Cell. It ensures the safety and security of women and protects women's rights in the workplace. It organizes various cultural activities and programs related to women.
- We celebrate the Bonalu Festival (Telangana Festival), Bathukamma Celebrations (Telangana Festival) which are celebrated predominantly by women of Telangana state, every year.
- Dr. K. Bhavani is a DL in chemistry and works as women's cell coordinator with a committee of five members. There is an internal complaint committee which looks into women related issues..
- Six CC cameras have been deployed for surveillance throughout the college campus and are monitored by the principal. the entrance and exit points of the college are guarded by gates and security guards.
- Morning and night watchmen are stationed at the entry to provide 24/7 security. They maintain a register that contains the entry and exit details of hostel students and any other visitors.
- We have 10 women teaching staff out of a total of 22 teaching staff, 02 women lab assistants and 05 women ministerial staff in the college.
- Our college gives maternity leaves, child care leaves, and any other leaves related to women staff, as per the leave rules of Telangana State.
- We celebrate Women's Day, annual cookery contests, and regular programs related to gender development every year.
- We have a one-woman nursing officer; she looks after the health status of female staff. She suggests health and hygiene related information to women staff.

Best practice 1:

Title of the Practice:

Advanced academic support through PG, Employability Skills, and IIT JAM Coaching.

1. Objectives of the Practice:

The primary objective of this practice is to provide comprehensive academic support to 2nd and final year students of our institution. The practice aims to equip students with advanced subject knowledge and career readiness through Postgraduate (PG) entrance coaching, Employability Skills training, and IIT JAM preparation. Ultimately, the practice seeks to enhance students' academic performance, increase their employability, and empower them to excel in competitive examinations like PG entrance exams of various state, central universities, PG in IITs etc.

2. The Context:

Our institution serves primarily the students from tribal communities, offering them a nurturing learning environment and opportunities for socio-economic upliftment. Recognizing the need to bridge the gap between academic learning and real-world application, the college initiated PG and Employability Skills coaching four years ago. Building on the success of this special academic initiative, the college recently introduced IIT JAM coaching to further enhance students' prospects in higher education prestigious institutions. Under IIT JAM coaching initiative, students from our sister institutions are also offered coaching who are selected through a screening test.

3. The Practice:

The practice involves a multifaceted approach to academic empowerment, encompassing PG coaching, Employability Skills training, and IIT JAM preparation. Students select either PG entrance coaching or Employability skills coaching based on their interest. PG coaching sessions are designed to deepen students' understanding of their respective disciplines to improve their chances in various PG entrance exams, while Employability Skills training focuses on developing essential soft skills such as communication, critical thinking, and analytical & arithmetical abilities. The introduction of IIT JAM coaching provides specialized guidance and resources to students aspiring for PG admission in prestigious institutions in the field of science and technology.

4. Evidence of Success:

The implementation of this practice has yielded remarkable results, as evidenced by the significant improvement in students' academic performance and competitive achievements. Many students from the

college have secured commendable ranks in various state and national universities with the help of the academic support provided by these initiatives.

5. Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

Despite its success, the practice has encountered challenges such as lack of adequate time to conduct these special classes from administration side and the need to balance between regular UG academic sessions and these specialized coaching initiatives for students. Adequate resources including qualified faculty, study materials, infrastructure are essential for the continuous implementation and expansion of these initiatives.

In conclusion, Telangana Tribal Welfare Residential Degree College for Boys, Karimnagar has demonstrated a steadfast commitment to holistic academic empowerment through its innovative coaching programs. By providing comprehensive support and fostering a culture of excellence, the college has not only transformed the educational experience of its students but has also set a precedent for effective educational practices that cater to the diverse needs and aspirations of students from tribal backgrounds.

Best Practice 2:

Title of the practice:

Implementing community outreach programs for holistic growth of the students.

Objectives of the practice:

The primary objective of these programs is to provide opportunities for students to interact with the wider society so that they get sensitized to the problems of the surrounding society. These programs also help them to maintain and develop a closer link to the community. Most of our students are from tribal communities who predominantly live in the remote areas of the state. These programs help them to engage with the mainstream society.

The Context:

The regular academic sessions the students attend as part of the UG programs may not equip the students to cope with the realities of the society they live in. These outreach programs help to bridge this critical gap in their learning process. Teaching learning process in class room environment has its own drawbacks. Community outreach programs help to address this critical need. Our institution organizes different outreach programs to help students interact with various sections of the society.

The practice:

The following activities are conducted as a part of community outreach in the institution.

Old age home visit:

As a part of community outreach, our students visited old age home in Karimnagar. Our students visit old-age homes twice a month. With this interaction, students learn about their problems and other related issues.

Cleaning of river bank bodies:

Our NCC students participated in the Puneet Sagar program, which aimed to clean the river bank bodies. So our cadets went to Lower Manair Dam (LMD) River Bank two days in every week at 5:30 p.m. in 2022–23 and cleaned the surroundings, collected the plastic bottles and wrappers and made the local people aware of the importance of plastic-free river banks.

Quest program (faculty's visit to the student's home on vacation):

In this program, faculty visits their students' homes during the holidays. The faculty knows the real lives of the students and their parents' situations. Faculty inquires about the health conditions and habits of their students. The faculty tells the parents about their son's interests in various activities, including academic ones.

Village Learning Center (VLC):

In the Corona pandemic, all schools and colleges were shut down. Students lost their physical bond with their schools and classes. To fill this gap, our college students voluntarily formed a village learning center (VLC) in their villages to teach free classes to the village students.

Visits to community assets:

This program aims to help students interact with society. As a part of community outreach, students go to Karimnagar bus station with the assigned faculty members. The depot manager interacts with the students. He tells about the facilities provided at the bus station to the passengers etc.

Visit to Telangana state minority residential school:

The Department of Chemistry conducted a community outreach program comprising students of both B.Sc. (BZC) and (MbZC) to educate the high school students of Telangana Minority Residential School and Sri Saraswathi Shishu Mandir School located in Karimnagar regarding the importance of chemistry in day-to-day life.

Evidence of success:

Community outreach programs have helped to develop deeper relationships between students and the communities surrounding the institution. It fostered a strong bond between student community and the sections of the society which nurtured goodwill between them.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

To visit various locations in outreach programs requires logistics which is a little expensive for the students and administration.
